

Lord, I see the things You ask of me Faithfulness, holiness and purity. I love Your truth, I long to show it to the world for You.



REVIEW OF GOD'S WORD

Let us review what we have learnt at our last Youth Worship!

YWS MESSAGE - 5 AUGUST 2023 "BY THIS YOU SHALL KNOW THAT I AM THE LORD" EXODUS 7:17

INTRODUCTION

- 1. The First Miracle performed Aaron's rod became a serpent
- 2. But this did not move the heart of the Pharaoh
- 3. His heart grew hard

THE FIRST JUDGMENT AGAINST EGYPT

- **14** So the LORD said to Moses: "Pharaoh's heart is hard; he refuses to let the people go.
- **15** Go to Pharaoh in the morning, when he goes out to the water, and you shall stand by the river's bank to meet him; and the rod which was turned to a serpent you shall take in your hand.
- **16** And you shall say to him, 'The LORD God of the Hebrews has sent me to you, saying, "Let My people go, that they may serve Me in the wilderness"; but indeed, until now you would not hear!
- 17 Thus says the LORD: "By this you shall know that I am the LORD. Behold, I will strike the waters which are in the river with the rod that is in my hand, and they shall be turned to blood.
- **18** And the fish that are in the river shall die, the river shall stink, and the Egyptians will loathe[to drink the water of the river." ' "

Exodus 7:14-18

- 1. The LORD spoke to Moses directly
 - a. To discuss the hardness of Pharaoh's heart
 - b. To go to Pharaoh when he goes to the River Nile to perform his religious rite
- 2. Moses would forewarn Pharaoh
 - a. That the mighty River Nile would be filled with blood
 - b. The fishes in the River would die
 - c. The Egyptians would not be able to utilize the water from the Nile
- 3. Then perhaps the Egyptians would know that He is LORD
 - a. To acknowledge that He is God
 - b. That He is the God of the children of Israel
 - c. That He is the LORD
 - d. That He has tremendous power

THE COMMAND GIVEN TO AARON

- **19** Then the LORD spoke to Moses, "Say to Aaron, 'Take your rod and stretch out your hand over the waters of Egypt, over their streams, over their rivers, over their ponds, and over all their pools of water, that they may become blood. And there shall be blood throughout all the land of Egypt, both in buckets of wood and pitchers of stone."
- **20** And Moses and Aaron did so, just as the LORD commanded. So he lifted up the rod and struck the waters that were in the river, in the sight of Pharaoh and in the sight of his servants. And all the waters that were in the river were turned to blood.
- **21** The fish that were in the river died, the river stank, and the Egyptians could not drink the water of the river. So there was blood throughout all the land of Egypt.

Exodus 7:19-21

- 1. Order of Ministry
 - a. God speaks to Moses
 - b.Moses speaks to Aaron
- 2. Aaron was to lift his rod and to strike the River Nile
- 3. The Judgment of the LORD
 - a. Aaron would strike the River Nile
 - b. In the sight of the Pharaoh
 - c. In the sight of his servants
 - d. The River was struck and it turned to blood
 - e. The River Nile was regarded as sacred
 - f. The blood was like the deity of the River Nile was wounded severely
 - g. The results were tragic!
- 4. Aaron's rod-serpent
 - a. It swallowed up the serpents of the Egyptian sorcerers
 - b. This was an amazing feat
 - c. It demonstrated the superior power of the LORD

THE RESPONSE OF THE PHARAOH

- **22** Then the magicians of Egypt did so with their enchantments; and Pharaoh's heart grew hard, and he did not heed them, as the LORD had said.
- **23** And Pharaoh turned and went into his house. Neither was his heart moved by this.
- **24** So all the Egyptians dug all around the river for water to drink, because they could not drink the water of the river.
- 25 And seven days passed after the Lord had struck the river.

Exodus 7:22-25

- 1, The magicians of Pharaoh
 - a. They duplicated the deed of Aaron
 - b. They used magical enchantments
- 2. The heart of Pharaoh
 - a. It grew hard
 - b. He refused to heed Moses
 - c. His heart was not moved
 - d. He returned to his palace (house)
- 3. The Egyptians had to dig fresh wells
 - a. Water from the River Nile could not be used
 - b. The Egyptians now had a taste of hardship
- 4. The length of the Plague
 - a. One week
 - b. The effects would remain for the entire week
 - c. The impact was planned by the LORD

REFLECTIONS

The first plague

After reading a few chapters of Exodus, we reached the study of the first plague. This first plague saw God turn water into blood. Water is life-giving, and important for the people of Egypt's survival. The conversion of water into blood not only meant that the water now stank, it meant that the people could not use it for farming, washing, drinking, and so many other purposes.

God's power

When God instructed Moses to speak to Pharaoh before the plague, He told him that "by this you shall know that I am the LORD". God spoke of the power that He would display, which had to be so great that no other could replicate! In those days, the people of Egypt believed in their own gods, that they could provide them with abundance and life. It was also believed that Pharaoh was an intermediary between the Egyptians and the Egyptian gods. But this plague revealed that these Egyptian "gods" were nothing compared to the LORD.

God's works

Pastor turned us to Psalm 111 last Saturday, to guide us on how to view and respond to this. Psalm 111 proclaims how God's works are honourable and glorious, and His righteousness endures forever. God's works, like the plagues, are powerful and they can strike fear in us. But when we study His works more, we see how God's works are not only powerful, but also purposive. God brought about these plagues to teach not only the Egyptians, but also the children of Israel, about His power. God may also allow us to go through unfavourable circumstances, in order to teach us lessons.

God's hand in our lives

In our modern day, we may not believe in other foreign gods. But there are still many things that may cause us to neglect or doubt God's power. These could be worldly ideas that have been instilled into us. For example, the idea of being a self-made man, who believes that one's achievements are solely through his hard work and effort. In our lives, God has provided many things, such as helping us to press on through different exams and assessments in school. A danger of oversubscribing to worldly ideas could be that we do not recognise these things which come from God's hand, but rather think that we attained these things by our sheer effort.

For me, I learnt to recognise that God is the One who brought me through most of my university life thus far, and the different challenges and setbacks I faced. I used to believe that it was hard work that would help me to do well in school and internships. But I learnt that there were so many variables beyond my control such as groupmates and teachers in school, colleagues and bosses at work. Even when there were unpleasant people I had to work with, God, who is in control, was able to answer my prayers, teach me lessons, and bring me through those circumstances.

Our response

Psalm 111 gives us an example of how we can respond to this. We can study God's works in the Bible and gain more understanding of who God is. We can also remember His many wonderful works in our lives as well. If we continue to be stubborn in our ways and stagnant in our understanding, we may end up not growing, and even worse, becoming hardened to His Word. Let us always be conscious of God's power and hand in our lives, and respond well, in order to have a more vibrant and dynamic faith!
