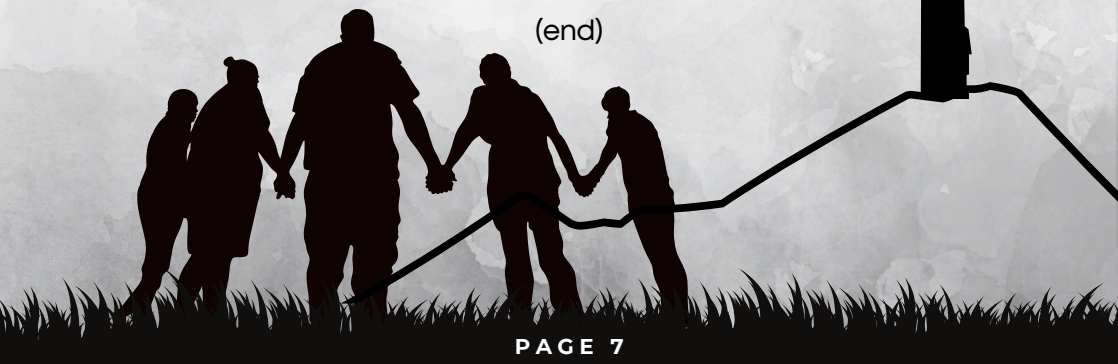

REVIEW OF GOD'S WORD

Let us review what we have learnt at our last Youth Worship!

YWS MESSAGE - 19 JULY 2025

“GOD’S ANGER WAS AROUSED” NUMBERS 22:22 NUMBERS 22:22-41

²² Then God’s anger was aroused because he went, and the Angel of the LORD took His stand in the way as an adversary against him. And he was riding on his donkey, and his two servants were with him.

²³ Now the donkey saw the Angel of the LORD standing in the way with His drawn sword in His hand, and the donkey turned aside out of the way and went into the field. So Balaam struck the donkey to turn her back onto the road. ²⁴ Then the Angel of the LORD stood in a narrow path between the vineyards, *with* a wall on this side and a wall on that side. ²⁵ And when the donkey saw the Angel of the LORD, she pushed herself against the wall and crushed Balaam’s foot against the wall; so he struck her again. ²⁶ Then the Angel of the LORD went further, and stood in a narrow place where there *was* no way to turn either to the right hand or to the left. ²⁷ And when the donkey saw the Angel of the LORD, she lay down under Balaam; so Balaam’s anger was aroused, and he struck the donkey with his staff.

Numbers 22:22-27

1. God’s Anger

THE DONKEY SPOKE TO BALAAM

²⁸ Then the LORD opened the mouth of the donkey, and she said to Balaam, "What have I done to you, that you have struck me these three times?"

²⁹ And Balaam said to the donkey, "Because you have abused me. I wish there were a sword in my hand, for now I would kill you!"

³⁰ So the donkey said to Balaam, "*Am I not your donkey on which you have ridden, ever since I became yours, to this day? Was I ever disposed to do this to you?*"

And he said, "No."

OPENING THE EYES OF BALAAM

³¹ Then the LORD opened Balaam's eyes, and he saw the Angel of the LORD standing in the way with His drawn sword in His hand; and he bowed his head and fell flat on his face. ³² And the Angel of the LORD said to him, "Why have you struck your donkey these three times? Behold, I have come out to stand against you, because *your* way is perverse before Me. ³³ The donkey saw Me and turned aside from Me these three times. If she had not turned aside from Me, surely I would also have killed you by now, and let her live."

Numbers 22:31-33

1. The Lord had enabled the donkey to speak to Balaam
2. Balaam had struck his donkey three times
3. The donkey queried Balaam

"What have I done to you, that you have struck me these three times?"

BALAAM'S CONFESSION

³⁴ And Balaam said to the Angel of the LORD, "I have sinned, for I did not know You stood in the way against me. Now therefore, if it displeases You, I will turn back."

³⁵ Then the Angel of the LORD said to Balaam, "Go with the men, but only the word that I speak to you, that you shall speak." So Balaam went with the princes of Balak.

1. Balaam expressed:

a, Some remorse

b. Also his ignorance of the presence of the Angel

c. He offered to return home

2. The Angel's word

- a. He may carry on with his journey

BALAK'S CONVERSATION WITH BALAAM

³⁶ Now when Balak heard that Balaam was coming, he went out to meet him at the city of Moab, which *is* on the border at the Arnon, the boundary of the territory. ³⁷ Then Balak said to Balaam, "Did I not earnestly send to you, calling for you? Why did you not come to me? Am I not able to honour you?"

³⁸ And Balaam said to Balak, "Look, I have come to you! Now, have I any power at all to say anything? The word that God puts in my mouth, that I must speak." ³⁹ So Balaam went with Balak, and they came to Kirjath Huzoth. ⁴⁰ Then Balak offered oxen and sheep, and he sent *some* to Balaam and to the princes who *were* with him.

⁴¹ So it was, the next day, that Balak took Balaam and brought him up to the high places of Baal, that from there he might observe the extent of the people.

YOUTH WORSHIP REFLECTIONS

RECAP

Last week at Youth Worship, we studied and revisited Numbers 22. Balaam was not a mere diviner, he had knowledge of the LORD, and the LORD even came to him. However, Balaam compromised on his faith and ended up walking in a way that was perverse to the LORD, by going against the LORD's commandments, and thus the LORD stood against him. However, the LORD gave him a chance by allowing his donkey to see the Angel of the LORD, before opening Balaam's eyes too. Balaam showed some remorse for what he had done. He was allowed to meet with Balak, but he must only speak what God instructs him to.

REFLECTIONS

This lesson was a reminder to me of the danger of worldly influences, and how it can negatively affect my walk of faith. These negative influences could come in various forms, whether it be in the form of social media content I see online or things I hear from friends. More often than not, I find myself being exposed to an array of information on social media reels or posts, and I realise how easy it is to simply believe what I read. These posts are often intentionally misleading, and may even be presented as from the Scriptures. However, such information may be untrue or partially false, and could even affect me in my walk of faith, by planting doubt or uncertainty in my heart and mind.



This lesson also gave me a different perspective on how the LORD may warn us when we walk in a way that is displeasing to Him. For Balaam, it was through his donkey that God rebuked him. Despite this, Balaam foolishly reprimanded the donkey, even beating it! I am reminded that the LORD can use various ways to warn us when we walk astray. God, in His grace and love, provides me with His Word to guide me, and also people around me, such as my parents, pastors, and teachers. They are people sent by the LORD to instruct and guide, so that I can walk in a way that is pleasing in His eyes. And yet, I find that when I am given advice, I frequently take it for granted, and sometimes even get upset or frustrated with them. This stubbornness can hinder me in my faith, through having a heart that is unwilling to listen to the LORD's guidance. This lesson opened my eyes to see how the LORD could be guiding and redirecting my paths through the people whom He sends to help me. I am seeking to learn to set aside my stubbornness, and to instead learn to trust in the LORD's leading and plan for me.

In my first year of Junior College so far, I found myself facing many new challenges, in terms of workload, of fitting in with others, and these have impacted my walk of faith in some ways. In trying to fit in with others, I was very tempted to follow their mannerisms and actions so that I would be included, or avoid being alienated.





But many of these actions included foul language, gossiping, and things that I know would not honour the LORD. In choosing not to join in their actions, I admittedly found that it was harder to fit in with certain groups of people. However, I saw the LORD's continued hand in guiding and encouraging me. Whether it was through the words of encouragement from His people, or even from the weekly messages that spoke deeply to my heart, reminding me of His presence each and every day.

This lesson was my reminder to remain steadfast in my faith, and not to let influences of others cause me to compromise on it. After learning this lesson about how Balaam, and his perverse ways, turned the LORD against him, I am deeply challenged to be more wary and cautious of the influences around me, and to grow deeper in my knowledge of the Word so that I can also guard my heart against them.

Recap

Welcome back to Youth Worship! Last week, we read from Numbers 22:22–41, where God’s anger was aroused because Balaam chose to go with Balak’s messengers, even though God had told him not to go or to curse Israel, for the people were blessed. Although Balaam said the right things outwardly, his heart was not right. He was willing to compromise God’s commandment for personal gain.

Reflection

This passage reminds me of the importance of living intentionally and guarding not just my actions but also the motives of my heart. As I prepare to start work, it speaks directly to my heart not just about outward obedience, but about what truly motivates me inside.

Balaam said all the right things on the surface, yet his heart was drawn to the rewards offered by Balak such as money, status, and worldly honour. God saw through his words and exposed the compromise in his heart.



This made me reflect on my own life. As I was going through the process of signing my work contract, I found myself fixated on the salary. Though I know in my mind that I do not need to seek recognition or measure my worth by money, I realised my heart was still quietly chasing after financial reward. That moment showed me how easy it is to start compromising not through dramatic disobedience, but through subtle shifts in desire.

Like Balaam, I might say I want to follow God's will, but if I am not careful, my actions can show that I still long for comfort, status, or success more than I long to please God. These small compromises reveal what I truly value, reminding me of the need to guard my heart diligently.

This passage reminds me of the danger of forsaking the right way and going astray, even while doing the right things on the outside. In 2 Peter 2:15, it says Balaam loved the wages of unrighteousness, and his example warns me not to trade faithfulness for fleeting gain.



Personal Challenge

So my prayer is to cultivate a heart that seeks to please God above all else not just in what I say, but in how I live, work, and make decisions. This means checking my intentions often, especially when faced with opportunities that seem rewarding but might pull me away from God's purpose. As I begin work, I will remember that my calling is to honour God and not compromise on my faith to chase after what the world defines as success.

AN EGYPTIAN BEATING A HEBREW

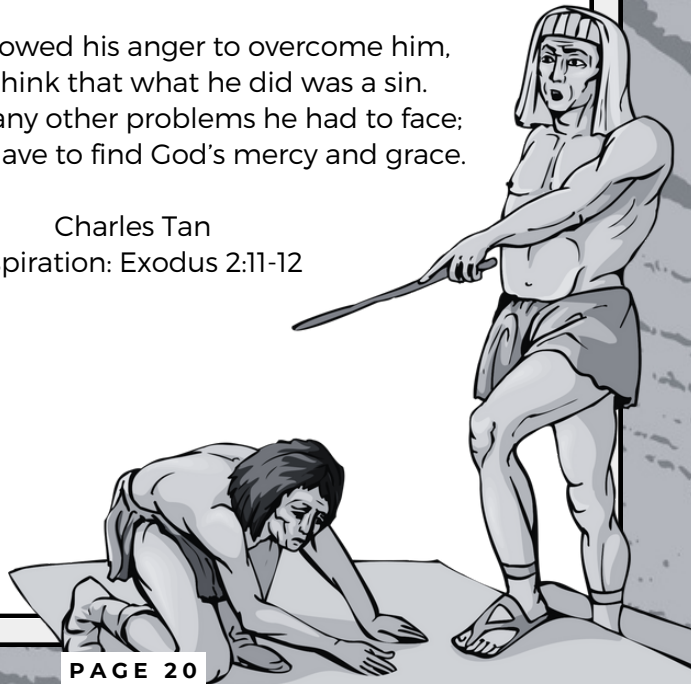
The years flew by and Moses became a man;
